

Our local specialist sexual health services and GP practices are open for all ages and ready to help.

A phone call to one of these services, or looking online, is the first step you need to take.

These 'Ask - Assist - Act' questions might be used by a local service to help find the right kind of support for you:

- Q: Are you in a sexual relationship at this time?
- **Q:** Do you need any help with contraception or changes to your contraception?
- Q: Are you worried you might be pregnant? Or could you be at risk of unplanned pregnancy?
- **Q:** Do you know where to get emergency contraception if you need it?
- Q: Do you know of websites that can give you access to free and confidential postal testing for sexually transmitted infections (STIs)?
- Q: Do you know where to get information or advice online about sexual health?
- Q: Have you recently experienced sexual assault or abuse?
- Q: Can we give you some help now in making an appointment with a local sexual health service?

Where can I get help around sexual health in Kingston?

Contraception and sexual health clinics, like your GP practice, have changed the way they offer their services, and you may not be able to walk in. However you can still get help quickly if you need it. You may be offered a same day or future telephone or video consultation, or you could be invited to attend the service for a face to face appointment.

I need to speak to someone about my contraception

Some of the national advice has changed around contraception, for example, the length of time for which you can be prescribed repeat contraception prescriptions.

Before you speak with a health professional, you can compare methods to see which might work best for you if you have not used contraception before, or are considering a change. Visit www.contraceptionchoices.org

Can I get emergency contraception from a pharmacy?

All local pharmacies offer emergency contraception for purchase.

This is also available free, alongside condoms, to those aged under 25 at some Kingston pharmacies. www.gettingiton.org.uk/services/kingston/emergency-contraception

If you've had unprotected sex, and need to prevent a pregnancy, seek advice **as quickly as possible**. Emergency contraception must be taken within 5 days of unprotected sex, though it's most effective if taken in the first 72 hours. Emergency contraception won't protect you from STIs.

The Wolverton Centre, Your Healthcare and your GP practice can also provide free access to emergency contraception.

What about GP surgeries?

Your GP practice can help you with confidential sexual health support, including for those patients aged under 16. Contact your GP as directed on their website, online or by telephone, to access repeat or new contraception methods, emergency contraception, condoms (if under 25) and some STI testing as part of their confidential service to all patients.

Where else can I get help for sexually transmitted infections (STIs)?

Aged 16-24 and worried about a possible STI - visit www.freetest.me. If you are under 16, please call the Wolverton instead on 020 8974 9331.

I think I might be pregnant

If you are happy to continue with your pregnancy, your GP practice is your first place to contact. If however you are unsure whether you want to continue with a pregnancy, you can self-refer to access free abortion services for advice and next steps.

Domestic abuse and sexual violence

Domestic abuse can be any behaviour which is used to harm, punish, control or frighten you. This includes mental, sexual, financial, emotional and physical abuse and other harmful practices such as female genital mutilation (FGM), so called 'honour' based violence and forced marriage.
